HIPPO VIRTUAL CARE AND OCHSNER HEALTH

Our collaboration with Ochsner Health, a 40-hospital, 100-site, \$4.3 billion health system serving the people of Louisiana, Mississippi and the Gulf South, will focus on using the Hippo Virtual Care platform to create applications and connected health technologies to support advancements.
